### **Unheard Perspectives**

### **HCPSS Budget Process**

The BOE will now submit its budget requests to Howard County Executive Calvin Ball early March. Dr. Ball is scheduled in April to submit his proposed budget to the County Council, which will then adopt the Howard County budget in May. Either the County Executive or the County Council may not fully fund the request made by the Board of Education.

If you would like to share your opinions about the HCPSS 2020-21 budget, such as maintaining class size, ongoing support for all academic and operational areas or continuing instructional programs at current levels, please contact the County Executive and the County Council.

Please consider testifying before the County Executive to share your opinions about the HCPSS budget. Registration opens February 27; details linked below. If you can't attend the hearing, you can submit written testimony.

A reminder that the County does not fund specific programs (music, G/T,etc) so it's important that any testimony relates to County's overall funding of the Board of Education's requested budget, not support for specific programs.

COUNTY EXECUTIVE: Save the date to come to the County Executive public hearing on the budget. March 12 at the George Howard Building 6pm. Access online sign ups available February 27th, by clicking <a href="here">here</a>.

COUNTY COUNCIL: The first public hearing on the operating budget will take place on April 22. More details on registration will be available soon.

#### **Health Room News**

FLU A, FLU B, STREP, and COMMON COLD

This season, the children of Fulton have experienced all of the above. They spread to others through airborne droplets. Only strep is a bacterial infection and needs an antibiotic.

What can you do to help your child not get one of these illnesses? Teach your child to wash hands with soap and water, keep hands off of face (these germs will enter the body through the eyes, nose, and mouth), and cover coughs and sneezes with elbow instead of hands.

If your child is sick and has a temperature over 100°, actively vomiting and/or diarrhea, keep home until fever free for 24 hours, able to eat and drink normally.

Inform health room staff if your child does have the flu and strep.

#### COUGH DROPS

The policy for cough drops is a note from parent giving permission to give and the cough drops. They will be kept in the health room, unless otherwise permission has been given by one of the health room staff.

#### CHANGE OF CLOTHES

Reminder: if you have not already placed a change of seasonal appropriate clothes in a zip locked bag, please do so. Children have already needed to change clothes because of bloody noses, bathroom accidents, muddy/wet clothing and food spillage.

#### STUDENT INJURIES

If your child is injured, and has any physical restrictions, please notify the health room immediately. Doctor notes are **required** for any injury needing more than 3 school days. If a student is on crutches, walker of any kind, an evacuation emergency plan will be done by the school nurse. If you are not sure of any injury, please contact the health room.

## **Curriculum Corner**

## **English Language Arts**

No matter if your child is in Kindergarten or 5th grade, it is important when they are reading independently- they are reading a book that is just right for them. Here are some helpful tips for the next time you visit the library or book store.

#### **HOW TO PICK A JUST RIGHT BOOK...**

#### Five finger rule

- 1. Choose a book that you think you will enjoy.
- 2. Read the second page.
- 3. Hold up a finger for each word you are not sure of or do not know.
- 4. If there are five or more words you did not know, you should choose an easier book.

Still think it may not be too difficult? Use the five finger rule on two more pages.

### Choose a book that is a good fit for you!

Read two or three pages and ask yourself these questions:

#### Will it be an easy, fun book to read?

- Do I understand what I am reading?
- Do I know almost every word?
- When I read it aloud, can I read it smoothly?
- Do I think the topic will interest me?

If most of your answers were "yes," this will be an easy book to read by yourself.

#### Will this book be too hard for me?

- Are there five or more words on a page that I don't know or am unsure of?
- Is this book confusing and hard to understand by myself?
- When I read it aloud, does it sound choppy and slow?

If most of your answers were "yes," this book is too hard. You should wait awhile before you read this book. Give the book another try later, or ask an adult to read the book to you.

## **Bully Buster Bulletin**

Kindness Week and the Kindness Pantry supply drive were a huge hit! Thanks to everyone who donated and participated spreading kindness. Today, February 26th is Pink Shirt Day. Pink Shirt Day is an anti-bullying initiative that began a few years back in Nova Scotia when a boy was bullied for wearing a pink shirt to school. Two other boys who witnessed the bullying organized the first Pink Shirt Day in support of the bullied student. Everyone they knew came to school wearing pink to show that they take a stand against bullying.

Also, we reached the top of the school wide mountain again for showing the 3Rs! We will be having our 2nd school wide celebration in March.

January/February lesson were completed by School Counselors. Kindergarteners listened to the book <u>Don't Squeal Unless It's a Big Deal</u>. We discussed tattling vs. telling and ways to solve kid-sized

problems. First graders listened to <u>Heartprints</u> and then played 'Have a Heart Bingo' demonstrating using kind words and building relationships. Each second grade class created an alphabet kindness book. Each student within the class was assigned a letter of the alphabet, wrote a sentence, and drew a picture describing a random act of kindness. Third grade students listened to the story <u>The Empty Pot</u>. Students brainstormed why it's important to be honest, even when telling the truth is hard. This is one way to show kindness and demonstrate trust. In fourth grade, we read the story <u>The Bad Case of Stripes</u>. We discussed believing in yourself, peer pressure and ways to stand up to peer pressure. Students reviewed one of the 3R's, RESPECT. Students were placed into teams and decided if an example showed respect or not.
