During Hispanic Heritage month, the Fulton community participated in a PTA sponsored collection, Pennies for Puerto Rico. Throughout the week of the collection, students learned facts about Puerto Rico during the morning announcements. When students learned that Puerto Rico was struggling to rebuild after Hurricane Maria, they were eager to help in any way possible. Students were encouraged to contribute whatever amount they could, but also knew that it was okay if they could not donate at this time. Many families helped to kickoff our collection during our Fall Festival on Friday October 13th.

Students donated to their grade level collection jar and knew that the grade that collected the most money for Puerto Rico would be able to move Freddie on their grade level Falcon Chart. Fulton's 8th Annual Turkey Trot General Information

Fulton's 8th Annual Turkey Trot will be held on Monday, November 20th for grades 3, 4, & 5 and on Tuesday, November 21st for grades K, 1, & 2. (schedule below!)

The students will take part in a **run** around a designated course. Upon finishing the run, each child will receive a certificate with a number on it. The points on each certificate will be random. The certificates will be added up by class and this total number will go towards the class's final Turkey Trot score. No matter when a student finishes the Turkey Trot course, he/she will still be contributing to their class score! The emphasis of the Turkey Trot is for our students to demonstrate to the community the importance of having a strong and healthy heart.

The event is also a **food drive**. This part of the Turkey Trot will show the community that Fulton students not only know the importance of having healthy hearts, but also giving hearts! We are asking that students bring in non-perishable food items to the box in their classroom. Each class will add **five (5) points** to their class's score for each item donated. The class in each grade with the highest Turkey Trot score (the total of points accumulated from the run and food drive, divided by the number of students in the class) will receive the *Turkey Trot Award*! We will also have a GRAND PRIZE (donated by the PTA!) for the class with the highest Turkey Trot score out of the <u>entire school</u>! The Grand Prize is a class party at *Pump It Up*!!

Greetings Fulton Families and Friends!

The Bully Busters are doing lots of fun and empowering lessons with our star students! In kindergarten, we learned how to be a good friend and practiced identifying characteristics of being a good friend in the book, *Chrysanthemum*. In first grade, we discussed the difference between tattling vs. telling with a story called, A Bad Case of the Tattle Tongue. In second grade, students practiced the "Golden Rule" treating others the way you want to be treated. In third grade, we reviewed the 3 key players in a bullying situation (Target, Bully, Bystander) and what bullying really entails. In fourth grade, we read the story, Mr. Peabody's Apple, which highlighted how fast rumors spread and that we must THINK before we speak. Finally, in fifth grade, students learned about indirect bullying and how it can affect students. Together, we are making Fulton Elementary a fun and safe place to be!

Why did my child move to another math or reading group or in the middle of the year?

We believe in flexible grouping. This is an equity issue ensuring that each child gets differentiated instruction to meet their individual academic needs. Flexible grouping means that grouping is targeted and not permanent and can be done based on a number of criteria.

- Groups can be developed based on performance.
- Groups can be developed based on ability.
- Groups can be developed based on the need for specific instruction.
- Groups can be developed based on interest.
- Groups can be developed based on the need for enrichment.

Educators can use grouping strategies to allow students access to appropriate levels of challenge and complexity. Our educators are participating in biweekly data protocols to look at students' academic needs and make data driven decisions around learning. Some of the data we analyze comes from teacher observation, classroom performance, formative and summative assessments, exit tickets, MAP performance data and PARCC data. When we practice flexible grouping, we allow for the most effective and efficient means of providing more challenging coursework to accelerate student learning.

Having an inflexible approach to grouping is often referred to as tracking and tracking is not a sound practice. Having flexible groups allows for educators to promote high levels of achievement and allows teachers to match a student's readiness with instruction, delivering the right content to the right student at the right pace and at the right time.

Dear Parents and Guardians,

In order to volunteer in the school or chaperone field trips you must complete the training required by the Howard County Public School System. There are 2 PowerPoint presentations that you must view. After viewing you will need to print out and complete certificates for each presentation.

Once the training certificates are completed and signed, they should be returned to your child's homeroom teacher. These certificates are kept on file throughout the school year and must be competed each new school year. Teachers must BOTH certificates on file to allow parents, guardians or other family members to volunteer in any capacity.
